Grant Project Summary

Searching for the Missing Voices and Art of Creole and African American Children is a uniquely designed, creative project that will directly support teachers and 3rd graders at JW Faulk Elementary School. Two Louisiana artists, Ernest Gaines and Clementine Hunter will be studied for third grade enrichment to support ELA and Social Studies Louisiana Believes standards. This project will offer children an inclusive opportunity to make connections for additional pathways of knowledge. This culmination of knowledge through a study of Creole and African American Arts will support a culturally responsive approach to Creole and African American children populations at JW Faulk. It is important for children see themselves in the art, to hear the voices and stories of the artists. Children need to have access to a culturally responsive approach to learning to make clear connections of self to content. We are from our stories and art that provides an authentic viewpoint of self realization; how self fits into community, state, nation and our world. It is important for children to make these valuable connections early on, to see leadership roles that address talent in underserved populations. This project will provide enrichment in a high need elementary school to support ELA and Social Studies through the arts. There is a need for authentic support resources for Louisiana classroom teacher's pre-prescribed curriculum. A literature review of children's literature and art (Pitre and Bourque, 2021) shows that there are limited editions of historic fiction and art are available for teachers to align with the Louisiana State Standards in Social Studies and ELA. There is an additional need for communities to collaborate with educators to bring a resourceful notion of cultural identity through oral historic fiction and art to support cultural authenticity.




THE SKY IS GRAY ANNOTATIONS AND RESPONSE



Save the Horse Farm


- The University of Louisiana at Lafayette purchased the land in 1920 for agricultural research, housing cows and then horses, soon being nicknamed the "horse farm."
- UL announced plans to allow the land to be developed commercially, but two students launched the "Save the Horse Farm" campaign to preserve the property.
- The land was sold by UL to the city of Lafayette in 2012 and the next year Lafayette Central Park, Inc. was formed to create and operate the park. It was named after James "Jim" Moncus, who donated the lead gift to the park.
- The park officially opened in January 2022.


