- ¹Approved workshops or trainings can include, but are not limited to: SCRCS, library, or university workshops. SCRCS Advance Workshops can be found on the UL Lafayette SCRCS website. 1 in person SCRCS workshop is equivalent to 2 virtual SCRCS workshops, thus, 2 virtual workshops would be needed to count for 1 workshop/training experience.
